

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS: Fall 2011

These requirements apply to all NDSU students in pursuit of a baccalaureate degree. Only courses approved by the General Education Committee and University Senate may fulfill category requirements.

Total Required General Education Credits.....40

The General Education core is 40 credits for students enrolling at NDSU fall 2007 and later (39 credits for students who transfer 24 or more semester credits). Students who enrolled prior to fall 2007 must complete a 37-credit general education core (36 credits if 24 or more semester credits were transferred).
