

CHECK OUTS

For those who are leaving University Apartments at the end of this semester, we hope that you all have submitted your 60-days vacating notice by now. This is a reminder for your checkout process. It is important to contact your complex manager 5-10 days ahead of your scheduled date to make an appointment. Failure to do so can result in \$50 improper checkout fee.

The basic purpose of checkout is to restore the apartment to the best of its condition so that our maintenance and custodian staff can spend least amount of time and money to repair and rebuilt the apartment into a new one. An apartment that has not been properly cleaned will cost extra time and money. In such situation, an extra fee may apply to the residents of the apartment. Please clean the apartment with efforts. The following is a cleaning list for you.

Kitchen

1. Replace drip pans

2. Wipe all cabinet doors, drawers, and countertop surfaces till no dust.
3. Pull out the stove and refrigerator; clean their sides and interiors; clean the floor where they were originally located
4. Clean the stove and stovetop thoroughly. Clean the interior of the stove till no black marks remain. Make sure to lift up the stovetop to clean the inside. Cleansing tools and products like oven degreasers are very helpful.
5. Clear all marks on the walls and ceiling.
6. Clean and vacuum the floor/ carpet till no dirt, no mark and no stains.

Living room and bedroom(s)

1. Replace all broken bulbs.
2. Clean closets and doors.
3. Wipe all blinds and windows.
4. Clear all marks on the walls and ceiling.
5. Clean and vacuum the floor/ carpet till no dirt, no mark and no stains.

Bathroom(s)

1. Replace shower curtain.
2. Clean all doors.

3. Clean sink, mirror, shower, and toilet.
4. Clear all marks on the walls and ceiling.
5. Clean and vacuum the floor/ arpet till no dirt, no mark and no stains.

ADDITIONAL TIPS

Hi Tenants, It is that time of the year again when those moving out get busy to finalize their checkout. Here are some checkout list that will really help in making this process successful.

1-Pay attention to uncleaned and broken blinds, as well as uncleaned screens will incur charges.

2-Clean your room thoroughly and watch for the corners and windows

3-Take care of the bathroom, staircase, and kitchen

You will incur huge charges for failure to do so, therefore kindly be aware.

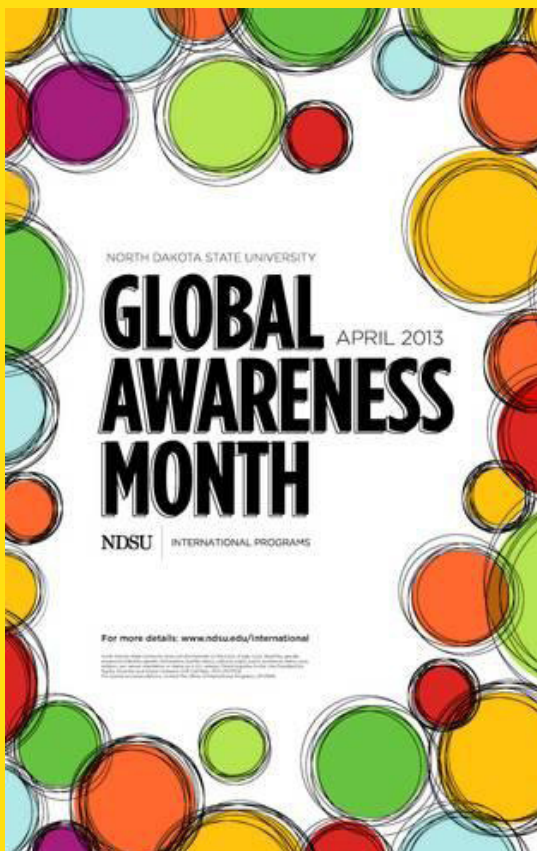

De-Modernization? The Case of Girls' Education in Tajikistan

Christopher Whitsel, Ph. D., Assistant Professor, NDSU Department of Sociology and Anthropology
Dr. Christopher Whitsel will discuss how sociologists have long been interested in the connection between modernization, industrialization and social changes. Scholars of inequality have been debating the Modernization Hypothesis, which

states that as countries industrialize inequality decreases, for many years. The collapse of the Soviet Union 20 years ago threw many of the poorest republics into a state of disorder. In Tajikistan economic output dropped, school enrollment declined, and the country experienced a civil war. The results have had lasting effects on education, especially girls' education.
