

Shooting Sports Match Guidelines

The following rules will be used in all North Dakota 4-H Shooting Sports Invitational Matches. The follow the guidelines developed by the National and North Dakota 4-H Competitive Shooting Sports Program and supersede any other rules. For rules of each single contest event, a national governing body exists for match procedures. While 4-H modifies some aspects of the match event, the rules of the governing body apply when 4-H rules are not enforced.

Contestant Eligibility

- All bona fide, active, North Dakota 4-H Shooting Sports members are eligible to
 compete in North Dakota 4-H shooting sports events. <u>Enrolled youth must be under the
 supervision of a certified 4-H coach.</u> Open-class participants must be registered in
 county or district events, under the instruction of a certified (NASP, CMP, or nationally
 recognized certification) coach, subject to limitations which may or may not be imposed
 by the specific event. State level national qualifying championships are open to <u>4-H
 members</u> only.
- 2. Competitors must show basic proficiency in the division before competing. By entry in these events, the guardian or team coach is verifying that the youth entered are knowledgeable and proficient in the safe use of the equipment, range safety, and the fundamentals of the event. Matches should not be their first shooting experience. Match and/or range officials may dismiss a participant if he/she believes the participant does not demonstrate the basic proficiency and knowledge required for safety or participation.
- 3. Contestant must have already passed his/her 8th birthday and not exceed 19 years old on January 1. Senior youth may not have passed his/her 19th birthday as of January 1 of the year in which the National 4-H Championships is held. Minimum age for match participation is listed below:

Firearm participants must be 11 years old and have taken a state hunter education/safety course.

Event Participation

County and district matches are open to all youth. State 4-H Championships require 4-H membership. <u>Participants must be proficient in their discipline and range safety before they can compete at any match level.</u>

Stipulations as follows:

Individual

Individuals may participate and are eligible for individual recognition and any subsequent event they may qualify. An enrolled 4-H member must be under the supervision of a certified 4-H instructor even if one is not available in the county. Participants that are not 4-H members must be registered in county or district events, under the instruction of a certified (NASP, USA, NRA, CMP, or nationally recognized certification) coach in that discipline. Individuals who compete on an upper age division team will be calculated into that team's score as appropriate. They will remain a participant in their individual age division competition as long as the contest is the same. (example: 3 Position air rifle, barebow indoor archery)

Team

<u>Composition</u> -- A full team is composed three individuals with a fourth member option. A county can have more than one team in any division. The first team will consist of the four highest scoring individuals and the second team of the next four highest scoring. From the roster of county members in that division, the highest three scores are computed for the first team with the fourth individual lowest score dropped. The next four individuals' scores are used in designating the second county team. With advance notice given to the match coordinator, a county can request to move up an individual to a team age division or to add one member from another county to make a team. Teams that are comprised of more than one county (co-op) can be eligible for national competition. Teams comprised of members from multiple counties for the sole purpose of team improvement are not allowed.

<u>Representation</u> -- A shooter may not represent more than one county's shooting sports program in any given event. All members or any team in 4-H events must meet the eligibility requirements, including enrollment in the shooting sports program as per sponsoring county. If the home county has enough members for a team in an age division, a participant in that age division cannot join or represent another county.

<u>Dual-Enrollment Members</u> – A participant can represent another county when there are no other discipline members available in the home county. Members who enroll in more than one

county must represent the county/club that they practice with. And, they must practice with the county they have joined. The participant must declare the county they represent in matches at the start of the competition season for each discipline. A participant in a second discipline may represent the home county and is not required to use the declaration for dual enrollment. The request to join another county must be approved by the home, joining county, and state program.

<u>Restrictions</u> – An individual or team may only participate in one age division of same age or older. A member can only participate on one team of the same event. A county may not replace a home county member with a member of another county. Counties with less than 3 competitors are not eligible for team awards.

National Contest Qualification

Participants must be enrolled 4-H members and actively participating in 4-H activities. Teams that have the highest overall event score qualify for the National 4-H Shooting Sports Championships in the following year. National qualification does not extend past the year youth have qualified for. They must qualify each season for the next national contest. There must be a minimum of three teams from three counties in the contest for a team to qualify for the national championship.

<u>Team Composition</u> – Youth in the senior age division are eligible to qualify as a team or individual to represent North Dakota 4-H Shooting Sports in the 4-H National Shooting Sports Championships. Youth may compete on the senior division team at 13 years of age but must be 14 on January 1 of the national contest year. The state champion and the top three members from the state champion team will comprise the national team, or all team members if the state champion is a member of that team. The alternate will be the fourth member of the county team if that member was displaced by the top scoring individual. The North Dakota state team will be the top four scorers when the minimum number of teams to qualify is not present.

<u>Exemptions</u> – State qualifying events that do not have three teams for state competition may qualify individuals for the national match by requiring an individual qualifying event or by choosing the highest placing four individuals at the state qualifying match.

For disciplines with few participants, a qualifying contest comprised of two events of three events contained within the national championship can be requested to the state coordinator. The contest must be approved by a state coordinator and conducted by a certified instructor not related to the youth. Generally, a score equal to the 12th place national team or 20th place individual in the preceding year is the benchmark score. This is based on 25 national teams with 50 individuals competing.

Physically Disabled Shooters

A shooter who because of physical disability cannot fire from one or more of the prescribed shooting positions outlined in these rules, or who must use special equipment when firing, is privileged to petition to the match director for permission to assume a special position or to use modified equipment or both. This petition will be in the form of a written request from the person concerned to the match director outlining in detail the reasons why the special position must be assumed or the special equipment must be used. The request should be made at least two weeks prior to the event.

Requests for accommodations to the 4-H Shooting Sports state coordinator are made by the match director as soon as the participant is registered but should be no less than two weeks prior so that resources can be provided for the event.

Event Awards

State level awards will be presented to the top three scoring teams and the five highest scoring individuals in each event

General Match Rules

Behavior and Sportsmanship

All participants and spectators are expected to demonstrate the highest level of sportsmanship, supporting the objectives and ideals promoted by the 4-H program in general and the 4-H Shooting Sports Program in particular. Shooters or coaches will render aid and/or testimony if asked to do so by any match official. All participants and observers are expected conform to the Code of Conduct as supplied, not only to the letter, but to the intent. Sportsmanship behavior includes helping others, scoring correctly, acting courteously, and conducting themselves in a safe manner.

Coaching

As a general match rule, limited coaching is permitted for beginners and junior divisions. However, coaching must never disturb other participants or delay a match event. Each county/team is limited to 1 "coach" per event. For indoors, the coaching line is the waiting line on the indoor range or off the firing line in air rifle and separate from the spectator area. Except during preparation time, coaches are to stay behind the waiting line and in the coaching area. The majority of coaching should be done before the match at home.

Coaches may assist the senior division shooter during prep time only. Once shooting for record begins, no coaching is permitted. Any request for coach assistance is made to the range officer and must be initiated by the shooter; the coach may not initiate contact with the youth. The shooter will put down their equipment, make it safe, leave the line, and then go talk to their

coach. Coaches may ask the line officer to have their youth come back to talk, but is not to initiate contact with the youth. Parents may not interact with their youth during match period.

Coaches may not handle firearms or equipment after the match begins nor advance to the firing line unless authorized by the range officer. A coach may set up his/her own spotting equipment. Specific coaching instructions may be issued at the range for each event.

Exception: Spotters and scorers in silhouette matches--

State team members will be split into different relays to permit shooters to spot for one another. Teams with three competitors may have one of the original pair spot for the third team member. Quiet conversation between the spotter and the shooter is permissible. An official scorer, either from another team or an event official will be assigned as an official scorer. Match directors will provide instruction as needed for scorers.

Cell Phones and Other Electronic Devices

Except in an emergency situation, cell phones, radios, or other electronic communication devices may not be used on or in the immediate vicinity of competitive ranges during active competition. Participants should not bring electronic devices to the shooting range during indoor matches. Electronic devices should be on silent and carried only for emergency uses on outdoor ranges. It is not permitted to wear any device that obstructs vision or hearing during shooting activities.

Drug and Alcohol Policy

No illegal drug use, smoking or vaping is permitted on or near the shooting activity by youth or adults. No alcoholic beverages may be consumed on the grounds during an event. Violation of this policy is grounds for disqualification, program probation or expulsion.

Match Requirements

Rules -- Knowledge of procedures and rules

Where possible, each of the state events have been associated with a National Governing Body (NGB) of which guidelines are located at the end this publication. 4-H retains the right of our match directors to modify contests to adjust for age divisions, facility size, time constraints, safety or individuals in the contest. It is the shooters and coach's responsibilities to read the NGB rule book and understand the procedures used in each event and comply with the rules and standards of the events. The 4-H Match Guidelines are the defining guidelines for any 4-H match. Questions in advance are encouraged to clarify any areas of misunderstanding or ignorance. Participants are responsible to know the rules of their event and stay within them.

Integrity of the Match

Match directors should work to provide a match that all competitors compete with the same requirements under the same conditions. Indoor factors that may change the match experience for some is excessive crowd noise, personal space, lighting, height of the target, and temperature. Outdoor experiences with a factor such as wind, rain, cold etc. cannot be controlled and youth are expected to adapt.

Medical Consent Forms

For 4-H youth not accompanied by a parent, the health/medical release forms must be with the coach or supervising adult at the time of check in at any North Dakota 4-H Shooting Sports Match. It is the responsibility of each team coach to verify with their local extension office that each 4-H participant has enrolled for state sponsored events. This assures participants have completed the appropriate ND health forms and code of conduct, medical and media releases, and shooting sports parent consent, liability waiver and assumption of risk forms.

All volunteers accompanying the team must also have completed health forms. Range officers or other event staff at any shooting event must have immediate access to these forms any time youth are participating in an event.

For non-members at county or district events, they should provide proof they are under the supervision of another accepted shooting sports program. Parents must sign a waiver of liability and behavior consequences to compete.

North Dakota 4-H Shooting Sports Program is not responsible for providing the medical authorization and health history of the non-member participants.

Dress Code

Participants are expected to dress appropriately. <u>Team uniforms or shirts with 4-H or ND Shooting Sports logos are required in matches.</u> Young people and adults should wear attire appropriate for the weather while remaining modest and socially acceptable. Safety equipment and closed toed shoes should be worn for all events. No sandals.

The 4-H logo is trademarked so its appearance cannot be altered in any way. We cannot endorse sponsors. A team or sponsor name cannot be written across or through the logos. The sponsors name or graphics cannot be the dominating feature of the shirt.

Clothing with sexually suggestive or violent wording or graphics; and alcohol, vaping or tobacco advertisement is not appropriate. Range officials have the final word concerning the dress code and may announce or address specific cases. All shooters and coaches should remember that they may be having photographs taken or be asked to interview for the media.

Coaches

Each team shall be officially represented by only one coach or accompanying adult. The coach can represent more than one team within that counties program. This coach is the only adult that permitted to contact range officials to obtain information. Coaches can notify range officers of an issue but cannot interact or interfere in the challenge/decision- making process with youth concerning the issue.

Match Safety

Safety must be the number one priority of range personnel, participants, and spectators. Standard accepted safety rules will be followed at all times; special safety considerations may be announced at each venue. The Match Director, Range officers, or other event staff may dismiss anyone from the range or crowd for unsafe behavior.

Safety Expectation for Matches:

Muzzleloader, rifle, shotgun, and pistol.

- 1. Coaches should inspect equipment before the match date. All shooting equipment must clear inspection at the site.
- 2. The equipment is cased until used and put away after the contest.
- 3. Clean Bore/Empty Chamber Indicator

The CBI or ECI must extend 3 inches beyond the muzzle with actions open or a device placed in the open action. These should be used in

It is expected that:

Muzzles pointed in a safe direction at all times. Generally, muzzle up not at the floor.

Actions are open and empty with ECI.

Trigger locks, gun cased, and fingers off until on the range

- 4. A contestant may not uncase or handle air shooting equipment or a firearm for purposes other than competing in the match. At no time should a gun be loaded off the range.
- 5. Wadcutter/match pellets for air rifle, factory loads for shotgun, 50 grain pellet and round ball for black powder are legal ammunition.
- 6. Eye and ear protection are required for firearms. Eye protection for air equipment. Closed toed shoes for all events.
- 7. All shooters and other persons on or in the immediate vicinity of the firing line, including coaches, range officials and any spectators must wear adequate eye protection (glasses or goggles) and ear protection. The equipment must protect both eyes.

Archery

- 1. Coaches should inspect equipment before the match date. All shooting equipment must clear inspection at the site.
- 2. The equipment is cased until used and put away after the contest.
- 3. Arrows must be straight and in good condition. Arrow diameter maximum is .422 inches.
- 4. Target points only.
- 5. Lighted nocks are illegal.
- 6. 12 lb. is minimum draw weight. Maximum is 55 indoors/60 lbs. outdoor.
- 7. Sky jacking drawing the bow above the target sight line is illegal. One warning will be issued and second is disqualification.

Match Objections

Match Committee

Membership must be comprised of minimum three and maximum of five certified instructors in the discipline event. A pool should be identified before the event. The committee will work with the state coordinators to certify ranges, apply state match guidelines, shooting sports policy, and to address match challenges and protests. The match committee can convene at a match to make decisions on an issue. A member with a conflict of interest with a team or individual bringing forth an issue must abstain from the process. Committee can refer to this publication or risk management policy to make decisions. If there is a chance of a challenge or protest, notify the state coordinator as soon as possible.

Disqualification and Suspension

A disqualification is determined when an intentional/unintentional act is performed to improve a participant's standing in the competition or to put another at a disadvantage.

Situations that warrant disqualification or program suspension:

- a. Altering scores.
- b. Unsafe range conduct.
- c. Altering equipment outside of match standards.
- d. Using ammunition or equipment outside of match standards.
- e. No use or refusal to use safety equipment.
- f. Exceeds age division limit.
- g. Unable to preform an effective and safe shooting process.

Challenges

Youth can present a challenge. A challenge will be considered a situation that cannot be resolved easily by both parties, match director and committee, and the youth participant. It is a situation that is related to the individual competitor and an interpretation of an action or requirement. A written challenge will be presented to the supervising state coordinator for further action. Photographic evidence or example should be made by the range officer at the time of the challenge.

In archery events, participants may review their partner's targets and ask for assistance for scoring with arrows remaining in the target. Assistance is not considered a challenge but a clarification. A range officer can verify any score and can ask another range officer for assistance. For archers, scoring must be reviewed by each archer before pulling the arrows of each end. Once an arrow is pulled or final signatures are placed on the score cards it is an indication of agreement and, the scoring decision is final. If there is a calculation error, an archer can ask for a correction. Two-minute time limit for shooting per end.

In air rifle, rifle, and muzzleloader events, targets scored by machine or hand will be available for review for 30 minutes after completion. At that time, a participant may challenge or ask for a clarification to a score. It can be rescored by hand or machine with the match director present, the score determined is the final decision. Once the review time has passed, the final score cannot be challenged.

A challenge for air rifle may be the scoring of a shot. For a shotgun event, it may be the foot placement of the shooter on the line for a valid shot score.

Protests

Only youth competitors may protest. Generally, protests are about a range condition, another's equipment, or behavior by another individual which may have given another competitor an advantage.

Situations that may call for protest include:

- a. Competitor feels injustice has been done to them individually.
- b. Conditions under which another competitor was permitted to fire.
- c. Equipment another competitor was permitted to use.
- d. A range procedure that was not followed.

How to Protest

A protest is warranted when a situation that is brought to the range officer and committee by a competitor cannot be resolved by agreement at the immediate time. It must be accompanied

by \$25 fee and a written copy of the protest. It is refunded if it is deemed viable or forfeited if not.

Official protests may be filed by youth in the following order:

- 1. Range Officer The protest is made orally to the chief range officer or other official present on the range. If not satisfied or rectified with that immediate decision—
- 2. <u>Match Director</u> The protest may be stated orally to the match director, indicating the decision of the range officer. The director will investigate and provide a determination. If not rectified or satisfied with this decision—
- 3. Match Committee The match director may convene the match committee for determination and resolution. The match committee with the match director will consider the protest statement and may ask questions of the shooter and range officials. The committee should review match guidelines to discover if the protest is governed by a written policy or rule. If the protest is in direct violation of a match guidelines or 4-H policy, the protest cannot be advanced. The \$25 is forfeited.
- 4. State Coordinator and Committee A protest that may not yield a clearly defined answer and is not resolved during the match day must be submitted in writing with any photographic examples to the match director and state coordinator, within 24 hours of the conclusion of the event. The match committee with the state coordinator will consider the statement, may ask questions of the shooter and range officials, and will render a decision in an expeditious manner not to exceed 3 days. The final decision will be rendered by the state coordinator and is final with no further appeal is possible. The \$25 will be refunded.
- 5. <u>Disqualification</u> a person can be disqualified from a match or the shooting sports program for unintentional or intentional acts. The degree of disqualification and result will determine the consequence of the disqualification. Unsafe behavior or intentional altering of standards, equipment, or scoring are most common grounds for disqualification.

INDOOR ARCHERY

North Dakota State 4-H 300 Round Guidelines

This is a popular round that is nearly identical to those shot by other local and national archery groups. It is a round that is often shot during archery club leagues. The program does not separate compound or recurve or other bow divisions as there are not enough competitors in those divisions to hold quality contests.



Participants can choose to shoot the single 40 cm spot face or 5-spot target. Scoring on the single-spot is X-5-4-3-2-1 and scoring on the 5-spot is X-5-4, with any arrow missing the scoring rings awarded a score of 0. An archer does not have any requirement to shoot an arrow in each of the five bulls. An archer may choose to complete his end with any numbers of arrows placed as desired. An arrow that breaks the line of a ring is scored the higher value of the next ring. Archers have the choice of 5 bull spot or single 40 cm spot side of target. Archers have

one minute per arrow to complete their ends.

Range Operation and Setup:

During the round a senior participant will shoot 65 arrows total - 5 for warm up and 60 scoring arrows. Arrows are shot in a group of 5 called an 'end'. A perfect score is 300 with 60 X's.

The distances that participants shoot at are 20 yards for Seniors (14-18 yrs.), 15 yards for Juniors (11-13), and beginners (8-10). Juniors and beginners shoot 35 arrows with a practice end of 5 arrows and 6 ends of 5 arrows for score. A perfect score is 150 with 30 X's.

The shooting line spacing recommended by the 4-H program is 36 inches per target (targets butted together) for one archer. Two shooting lines (A and B) are to be formed with each taking a turn to shoot their end. Targets should not be more than on arrow length from the backstop or curtain.

Whistle commands are the preferred way to control the range. Two whistle blasts are used to get bow, one whistle blast to shoot, three whistle blasts to retrieve the arrows. Five or more whistle blasts or a call to cease fire is used as an emergency signal on the archery range.

Equipment Standard for Indoor Contests:

Freestyle - includes all compound bows drawn by a release aide, with sights, stabilizers. Magnification is legal. Target freestyle recurves are drawn by fingers, have sights, and stabilizers. No magnification Maximum poundage indoors is 55 lbs. for all bows.

Arrows with target points only. Arrow diameter maximum is .422 inches. No lighted nocks.

Two minutes per end shooting time limit. A scorecard change must be approved by range officer. Scorecards must be signed by shooting partner.

North Dakota 4-H Barebow Indoor Guidelines



The indoor contest for barebow (recurve or compound) is on the 10 ring 80 cm target face. All archer age divisions shoot 6 ends of 5 arrows at 15 yards for a total score of 300. Each arrow is scored up to 10 points with ties broken by the number of 10s scored. An arrow that breaks the line of a ring is scored the higher value of the next ring. The archers are given one warm up end at the start of the match. Archers have one minute per arrow to complete their ends.

Range Operation and Setup:

Targets can be spaced two arrows apart from bullseye to bullseye. Shooting line would have a minimum individual shooting lane of 30 inches for each archer at one time (targets spaced).

The shooting line recommended by the 4-H program is 36 inches per target (targets butted together) for one archer. Two shooting lines (A and B) are to be formed with each taking a turn to shoot their end. Targets should not be more than on arrow length from the backstop or curtain.

Whistle commands are the preferred way to control the range. Two whistle blasts are used to get bow, one whistle blast to shoot, three whistle blasts to retrieve the arrows. Five or more whistle blasts or a call to cease fire is used as an emergency signal on the archery range.

Equipment Standard for Indoor Contests:

Barebow Compound and Recurve – includes all bows drawn and fired by fingers, tabs, gloves, no sights, stabilizers are legal. Release aides are not permitted. Minimum bow poundage is 12 lbs. Mini-Genesis must be at max. lbs. Maximum bow poundage is 55 lbs.

Arrows with target points only. No lighted nocks. Arrows must be all the same length and in good condition.

Arrow rests should not extend more than ¼ inch above the arrow. We understand that some instructors start out with whisker biscuits. We will accept them but youth are expected to be taught to successfully draw the arrow without pinching it or tilting the bow.

Two-minute time limit for shooting per end. Scorecard changes must be approved by a range officer. Scorecards must be signed by shooting partner.

MUZZLE LOADING RIFLE GENERAL RULES

- 1. Rifles shall have a marked ramrod in the barrel except while loading or firing. Loading will take place at the loading line.
- 2. No direct loading from bulk containers, cans, bottles, powder horns, etc. is permitted.
 - Charges shall be transferred from horn or flask to the muzzle using a powder measure or similar device at the loading table.
 - No pre-measured powder charges allowed.
 - Capping or charging will take place on the firing line.
 - Except while measuring a powder charge, no powder container shall be left open.
 - Any open container will be confiscated by range staff.
 - No wooden ramrods allowed.
 - Round balls only

EQUIPMENT STANDARD

EQUIPMENT	Rifle: Any traditional or non-traditional NMLRA Conventional muzzle loading rifle (in-lines permitted); Sights: Metallic – non-traditional permitted (open or aperture); Position: Standing –no slings; Ignition: percussion cap, or flintlock. Number 209 primers are permitted; Maximum charge of 60 grains of black powder or its equivalent is allowable. Caliber has no limits. All events are restricted to patched rounds balls only. Spotting scopes are permitted.

MUZZLELOADING RIFLE SILHOUETTE

This is a 4-H 'hybrid" event that fits neither NRA Black Powder Silhouette nor NMLRA Silhouette. The steel silhouette and distances are used in order to allow the use of an NRA smallbore silhouette range and standard NRA targets. This contest can be age adjusted for junior age division. Paper or posterboard silhouettes regulation size can be used.

SHOTGUN EVENTS

All shotguns must be opened immediately upon being uncased with the muzzle(s) pointed in a safe direction until they are placed in the racks on the range. Shotguns must be carried from station to station with the action open and the muzzle(s) pointed in a safe direction.

TIE-BREAKERS & SCORING	Tie breaks may be done by shoot-off described above to establish the top individuals and the top teams. Shooting order and positions will be determined by the match officials.

SMALLBORE RIFLE EVENTS

General Rules

- All smallbore rifles are required to the action open and a CBI (Clear Barrel Indicator) in place when the rifle is not being fired and is uncased. Either commercial or personally made flags are permitted.
- Cased rifles will be the last equipment to be brought to the range and the first to be removed from it.
- Official weight of a rifle will be determined with the magazine inserted in the rifle.
- The CMP rifle trigger must be capable of lifting and supporting the 3.0 # weight without firing. Triggers which break as the weight is lifted will not pass.
- No cell phones on the firing line

NRA THREE-POSITION

TARGET	USA /A - 50
RANGE	May be either 50 yards or 50 feet depending upon host.
COURSE OF FIRE	20 shots in each position – prone, standing, and kneeling – in that order at 50 meters (or 50 yards); 60 record shots
TIME LIMIT	One (1) minute per record shot prone; two (2) minutes per record shot standing; and one and one-half (1-1/2) minutes per record shot kneeling.

EQUIPMENT	NRA Smallbore silhouette rifle rules (rule 3.2) closely follow the high power rule (rule 3.1). A synopsis follows: maximum weight – 10 pounds 2 ounces including sights. Any sights, telescopic or metallic, scopes may not be placed more than 2 inches above the rifle (top of receiver to bottom of scope tube), any safe trigger, release triggers NOT permitted, stocks must be of conventional design, barrel no longer than 30 inches, "chin rest" stocks prohibited, combs may not extend above the center line of the bore, the toe of the stock may not extend more than 7 inches below the center line of the bore, butt plate or recoil pad cannot extend below the lower line of the stock.
AMMUNTION	Cartridges up to .22 rimfire long rifle standard or high velocity may be fired in this event. Hot or hyper-velocity loads, such as stingers are NOT permitted.
SHOOTING POSITION	The standard standing position used in position shooting is permitted.
SHOOTING ORDER	Each shooter will be assigned a firing point and will rotate to the right upon animal changes.
SCORING	Targets knocked down or off the stand in proper sequence are scored as hits (+1). Any target shot out of order is recorded as a miss (0). If a target is not available, the shooter may go to the next available target or return to an earlier target with scorer knowledge and shoot it as a substitute. If no targets are available the shooter will get an alibi target before the next stage begins.
SPOTTER	Each shooter may have one spotter with them on the firing line who may have scopes and binoculars to advise the shooter where shots are hitting. The spotter will also keep time and advise the shooter in a quiet voice. The spotter must be from the same team. The spotter may not touch the shooter or the shooter's equipment after the shooter assumes their position on the firing line. Coaches cannot spot without clearance.
