Greetings, and welcome to the Rural Leadership North Dakota (RLND) Class X Graduation Summary Booklet.

The mission of Rural Leadership North Dakota is to prepare and develop effective leaders who will strengthen our state. The members of Class X, consisting of fourteen outstanding individuals from across North Dakota, demonstrated this mission in action throughout their intensive 18-month journey. Their experience began in November 2023 and brought them across the state and around the world. Through seven in-state seminars, a regional seminar, a national seminar in Washington, D.C., and an international seminar in Ghana, participants were challenged to grow as individuals, collaborators, and community leaders. Along the way, they engaged with industry professionals, policy leaders, farmers, educators, innovators, and one another, exploring the intersections of people, place, and purpose.

CLASS X DISTINGUISHED ITSELF IN MANY WAYS:

- They became the first RLND class to travel to Ghana and step foot on African soil, expanding the program's global lens while exploring shared challenges and opportunities across cultures and continents.
- They collectively raised over \$60,000 in sponsorships, setting a new RLND record with 26% more support than any previous class. This remarkable effort significantly enhanced the program's financial sustainability and reach.
- They cultivated a class culture grounded in mutual respect, humor, and collaboration. By supporting one another through challenges and celebrating each other's growth, they demonstrated that leadership is not only about influence, but also about trust.

The depth and breadth of their experience are also captured in the data. A dedicated insert in this publication presents a visual overview of their impacts.

These accomplishments reflect more than statistics or milestones. They represent the experiences that shaped the individuals in Class X that challenged, inspired, and ultimately transformed their understanding of leadership and service.

Their motto, **Xperience**, **Xplore**, **Xpand**, captures both the spirit and the trajectory of this group. From exploring their personal leadership identities to expanding their impact across communities and industries, Class X approached every seminar, challenge, and opportunity with curiosity and courage. 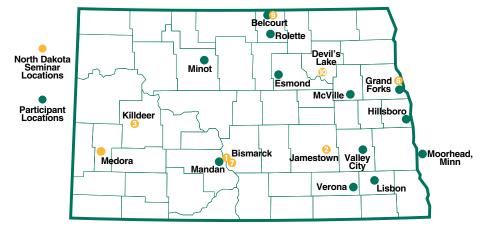

We came to Bismarck for our first seminar from every corner of North Dakota, producers and planners, educators and entrepreneurs, curious about what we could build together. Very quickly our RLND class found a rhythm and a compass that was leadership in the unknown:

the X Factor

It turned into a motto for Class X:

the X Factor: XPERIENCE | XPLORE | XPAND

It became the way we showed up for one another and for the places we serve. **XPERIENCE.** We led with presence: listening on shop floors and in council rooms, walking ranch roads and main streets. In Jamestown, Killdeer, Devils Lake, Grand Forks, and Belcourt, we delved into real issues like workforce and housing, water and energy, healthcare and succession. And we practiced the habits of everyday leadership: ask good questions, convene the right voices, act on what we learn.

XPLORE. We widened the lens beyond county lines. Minneapolis showed us how cooperatives, logistics, and cultural districts knit urban and rural economies together. In Washington, D.C., we sat where policy meets people, learning how data, story, and coalition turn priorities into progress. And in Ghana, a global classroom reframed resilience through cocoa research, feed and markets, heritage and entrepreneurship, reminding us that problems and possibilities face every community.

XPAND. With every seminar our skills, networks, and confidence grew. We sharpened communication with emotional intelligence and crucial conversations. We learned to map systems instead of silos. We measured success in relationships as much as results and made a shared commitment to multiply leadership: creating conditions where more people are invited, prepared, and empowered to lead.

This recap is not an ending, it is a look back so we can look forward. Each of us now carries an individual community project shaped by what we have experienced, where we have explored, and how we have expanded. Together we are ready for the next chapter: turning learning into local impact, turning cohorts into coalitions, and turning today's growth into tomorrow's opportunity; one community, one project, one new leader at a time.

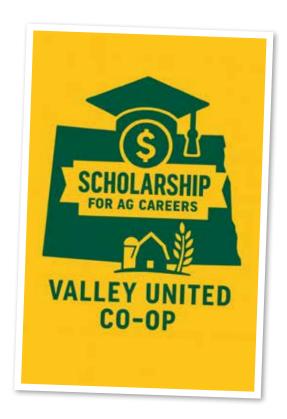
PROJECT SUMMARY

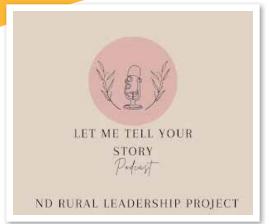
Valley United Scholarship tackles a growing workforce gap by encouraging local students to pursue agriculture degrees and return to careers with their hometown cooperative. The plan creates multiple scholarships for high school seniors, with selection criteria aligned to Valley United Co-op's

mission and values. A committee, supported by CEO Paul Coppin, marketing director Abby Adams, and Central Valley School, will set the budget, finalize application materials, promote the opportunity, review applications, and award funds, with an annual program review to refine impact. Key milestones include committee formation, criteria and budget approval, rollout through area schools, and the first awards cycle. Primary challenges are funding enough awards to reach all communities and ensuring applicants demonstrate genuine interest in agriculture careers. The long-term vision: build a reliable, homegrown talent pipeline for North Dakota's cooperative system.

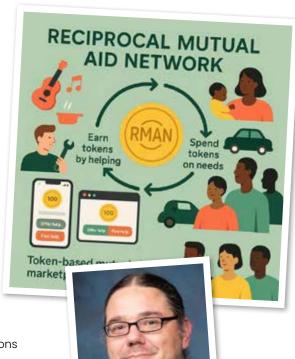

PROJECT SUMMARY

The Reciprocal Mutual Aid Network (RMAN) designs a community marketplace where people trade time, skills, and goods through a token-based system. Participants earn tokens by offering services like music lessons or childcare, and spend them on what they need, like home repairs or rides, removing cash barriers and honoring diverse abilities. The platform will launch as a web and mobile app built by a lean founding team and guided by church and nonprofit partners to ensure trust, safety, and early adoption. The year one milestones include incorporation, platform build, and pilot launch, followed by outreach to community groups to grow users and ambassadors. Beyond technology, the project emphasizes equitable access, transparent governance, and neighbor-to-neighbor resilience. By aligning volunteers, local organizations, and practical problem-solving, RMAN aims to expand economic participation, reduce isolation, and create a repeatable model of mutual aid that any North Dakota community can adopt.

Class Experience My class experience helped me make a lot of new connections and was very enlightening. I was able to learn about many topics, places, and ideas that I have never been exposed to before.

PROJECT SUMMARY

I am often called on as a spokesperson for ag. In doing so, I recognize even greater opportunities to share the message of agriculture and family farm. I want to create a concise, photo-rich keynote that tells the story of a North Dakota family farm across the seasons, how food is grown today and who's behind it. As a farmer from north-central ND now working alongside her son and daughter-in-law, I partner with

groups like NDFU and CommonGround to bridge the gap between producers and consumers and explain how modern practices keep food safe. I'm refining an engaging talk that blends humor, plain language, and visuals to make agriculture relatable. I'll consult experienced speakers, collaborate with family business partners on topics, and connect with community groups to book events. I hope to share this message on regional and national stages, helping policymakers and the public better understand rural communities and the vital role family farms and ranches play in North Dakota's economy and way of life.

PROJECT SUMMARY

Hillsboro VFW revitalizes a small-town cornerstone by widening its appeal and engaging the next generation. Hillsboro's VFW membership skews older, and I plan to partner younger residents with longtime patrons to make the post a welcoming hub for all ages. The effort adds high-energy, low-barrier activities like chili cook-offs, games, and themed meal nights, while organizing volunteer service projects (cleanups, drives) that connect families, students, and veterans. Collaboration includes VFW leadership and local business owners to coordinate events, sponsorships, and in-kind support. Early milestones focused on community buy-in, event planning, and building rehab to improve usability, followed by a rotating menu of special meals and a signature Chili & Chocolate Contest. A key lesson has been navigating restrictions on gaming and state funds. Success is measured by new faces, fuller calendars, and stronger civic ties.

Class Experience RLND can offer a lot of things, Networking, insight, friendship, and experiences. These were the things that I took from this class.

PROJECT SUMMARY: SUCCESSION SUCCESS

With ND's aging ag population there needs to be a practical bridge between today's producers and tomorrow's operators that includes, matchmaking, education, and certified guidance to keep working lands working. Connecting for Success includes work towards a successor-matching and succession-planning platform inspired by Nebraska's "Land Link." The platform connects ranchers and farmers without heirs to motivated next-generation operators, creating practical pathways for continuity of

operations and stewardship of working lands. Building on the original matchmaking concept efforts include a comprehensive "Succession Playbook" that outlines transition scenarios, legal and financial considerations, and step-by-step transition strategies. The playbook will anchor a series of educational seminars for producers, families, and lenders. To strengthen delivery and credibility, I'm also pursuing certification as a succession planner, positioning the project within existing rural finance networks. Together, these components aim to reduce barriers to entry, preserve family operations, and support resilient, sustainable rural communities.

Class Experience RLND has been transformative. Traveling across North Dakota broadened my understanding of our state and its communities, even if we couldn't visit them all. I've shared what I learned with the boards I serve and local groups, including presenting our Ghana trip to the Rolla Kiwanis and my son's sixth-grade class. Most valuable are the relationships.

The Rural Visibility Resource Guide empowers rural community champions with practical tools to strengthen their impact. Focused on increasing online visibility, the guide helps rural leaders understand how digital presence can attract visitors, support local businesses, and generate added dollars for communities. It provides simple, easy-to-use resources that maximize visibility through search engines, websites, social media, and other free or low-cost tools. The project will be piloted in Nelson County to test content, identify challenges, and refine resources. Key steps include creating the Playbook outline, populating topic-specific content, reviewing a draft with partners, launching the Playbook with community groups, and conducting follow-up evaluations to ensure effectiveness and sustainability.

PROJECT SUMMARY: STUTSMAN-BARNES WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP COHORT

North Dakota has one of the greatest needs for leadership in the nation with research indicating one in every thirteen adults in the state must serve in a leadership role—whether on school boards, nonprofit boards, or local government—to sustain and strengthen our communities. With so many opportunities resting on a small population, the need to develop confident, skilled, and connected leaders is greater than ever.

The Stutsman-Barnes Women's Leadership Cohort, launching in 2026, is designed to help meet that need by cultivating and connecting women leaders across both counties. This five-session program, held from January through May, will bring together women from diverse industries to learn, grow, and collaborate through hands-on learning, mentorship, and community engagement. Participants will build meaningful networks, strengthen personal and professional skills, and explore practical ways to lead within their organizations and communities. Through a focus on networking, development, service, and regional impact, the program aims to empower participants to take on leadership roles with confidence and purpose. The goal of this program is to build future leadership capacity of our region—creating a ripple effect that will benefit local organizations, businesses, and communities for years to come.

PROJECT SUMMARY

Roots of the Land strengthens North Dakota leadership by centering Indigenous history, perspectives, and contemporary contributions within Rural Leadership ND programming. Too often, Indigenous communities are overlooked or treated as separate from local development.



This project builds shared understanding as a prerequisite for equitable growth. I will create a culturally grounded curriculum aligned to RLND, then develop a training plan for current participants, future classes, alumni, and extension partners. A "train-the-trainer" model and facilitator roster, paired with community resource guides will enable delivery statewide and year-over-year. Collaboration is core, with partners such as Turtle Mountain College, RLND Indigenous alumni, tribal leadership, and the ND Indian Affairs Commission. Milestones include completing the curriculum by the end of Class X and deploying the training plan for Class XI and beyond, embedding inclusion as standard practice in ND leadership.

PROJECT SUMMARY

My project combines my love for cooking and local foods by combining those passions to create recipes featuring North Dakota grown ingredients. The intent is to inspire people to try new foods grown right here in North Dakota. For example, we are one of the largest producers of lentils, a pulse crop that doesn't get much table time in our homes. As chef/owner of Joy Full Foods, I'm creating approachable, tasty recipes (e.g., Teriyaki Lentils with a how-to video) with clear nutrition messaging to show why pulses are affordable, healthy additions to everyday meals. I worked with the North Dakota Department of Agriculture to create a web series where we showcased practical "cook it tonight" recipes with cooking demos and step-by-step recipe cards so anyone can recreate the dish at home.

Class Experience As a member of RLND Class X I learned so much more than I could have ever imagined. Beyond the experts and leaders we met, it was my classmates that pushed me to think deeper and more openly.

PROJECT SUMMARY

The Rainbow Safe House & Resource Center is a suicide-prevention initiative for LGBTQIA+ youth and young adults in North Dakota. 2023 YRBS data show 15–25% of students question or identify as LGBTQIA+, with 600-3,200 at elevated suicide risk amid higher bullying and harmful rhetoric. The Center will offer a welcoming, judgment-free space to ask questions about gender and sexuality;





provide evidence-based information and referrals; connect youth with trusted, supportive adults; and, when needed, offer short-term safe refuge. Early priorities include compiling statewide resources, creating a support network within the North Dakota University System, and building partnerships with advocates, educators, health professionals, faith leaders, and parents. The project will formalize as a nonprofit with a board and a physical location in Valley City. Ultimate goal: reduce risk and save lives through access to trustworthy information and community support.

Class Experience Leadership starts with a good story! I am now better able to articulate leadership and my role in the process and, therefore, get more support to enable change.

PROJECT SUMMARY

Golden Threads connects Lisbon High School students with older adults to reduce loneliness, foster empathy and respect, and create community and connection across generations. The program pairs teens and older adults for monthly group activities; such as service projects, conversations, games, and other activities. Partners include Lisbon High School's FCCLA chapter and the Aging in Community Local Steering Committee. Key milestones have been both publicizing the project and recruiting participants. With outreach ongoing, we have also started to document group activities and lessons learned into a replicable toolkit for other Extension agents in the future. Golden Threads aims to build durable intergenerational friendships and offer a model rural communities can adopt.

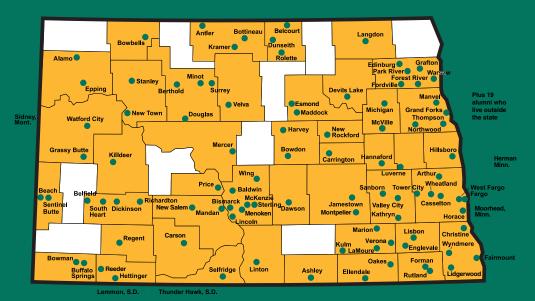
