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Ag and Natural Resources: Issues and Education


Tri County Plot Tour—July 2025: Annual demonstration/research tour showcasing a wide range of crop varieties and production variables. (Herbicides, row spacing, intercropping). Approximately thirty Tri County producers attended this years event.

Hay (forage) mold sampling: Our office assisted the NDSU Extension Central Grasslands Research Center (Streeter) with a hay mold study. They are collecting samples of hay from our region to better understand the types of mold present in our forages and hope to offer forage production guidance based on the research. Our office submitted over 20 hay samples from Logan County. Results pending.

National Sunflower Survey Sampling: A bi-annual survey of area sunflower fields for yield and production practices, weeds, insects, disease, and bird damage. 13 fields were surveyed in the Tri-County area with results submitted to NDSU Plant Science for tabulation and reporting. Results pending.

Spotted Water Hemlock awareness

Spotted Water Hemlock—a native noxious weed showed up in many parts of Logan County this year. It thrives in unusually wet conditions and grows best in shallow standing water areas. The plant contains a toxin called *cicutoxin* and can be deadly to livestock if eaten. Humans should exercise caution when handling as well. The plant was widespread in ND this year and caught the attention of several Extension Agents and Extension at large. Our office provided a press release on awareness in the Napoleon Homestead and offered in person guidance at a number of programs held this summer.

Disaster Table Top Exercise (Josh)—State Capitol

NDSU Extension, County Emergency Managers, and Disaster Responders joined together for a day of disaster incident professional development. Personnel from each group were paired together to discuss a fictional disaster scenario and come up with action plans for various stages of the disaster. This was a full day of scenario based discussions and learning objectives with facilitators from Montana State University, Texas A&M, and the National Extension Disaster Education Network (EDEN). Training objectives included: Mitigation, response, and recovery process/Roles and responsibilities of county, state, federal officials/ Roles of Extension/Public Health concerns/Community planning

Black Hills Recreational Leaders laboratory (Dustin)

Dustin participated in the 79th annual Black Hills Recreation Leaders Laboratory at the Outlaw Ranch, located near Custer, SD. Over the course of a week, the primary focus was on building character within groups, a skill greatly needed among the youth of our communities. In addition, collaborating with adults in our communities to form more effective volunteer groups to complete activities was a focus. Each of us brings different skills to a group, and each person has a different method of completing tasks. How do we work better with those who lead from the heart, and not from the mind? Should there be a focus on the progress and process, or just on the results? These and countless other topics were discussed and developed over the week.

Rural on the Rise—Community leadership seminar (Dustin & Josh)

The North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives coordinated a vital learning opportunity about emerging trends in our communities. Both Logan County Agents were able to attend the training and information session. Ben Winchester from U of M Extension shared new data on the state of housing in counties across North Dakota. As part of our Leadership and Civic Engagement service to the communities, we discussed the state of our own housing in Logan County and what might be some logical solutions to increase and maintain its availability.

Tri County Plot Tour

Approximately 30 area producers took part in this annual event held at the NDSU Extension research plot along Hwy 13. Many varieties of small grains, soybeans, canola, and peas were part of several experimental demonstrations. With the unusual weather conditions this year, it was interesting to see how all of the experiments performed. There were many questions among the producers and Extension personnel that lead to some thought provoking discussion. Josh presented on the issue of Spotted Water Hemlock—a native noxious weed of concern for this area.
