
Sandy Grande, Ph.D., M.A., B.F.A.



Dr. Sandy Grande is a professor and chair in the education department of Connecticut College and a faculty fellow in the Holleran Center for Community Action and Public Policy (2011-2013). She has served in a number of administrative capacities at the College including Special Adviser to the President for Institutional Equity and Diversity (2004-2005) and faculty representative on the Strategic Planning Committee (2003-2004). In 2004 she was also appointed to chair the committee to develop the Center for Comparative Study of Race and Ethnicity (CCSRE) at the College, which was subsequently established in 2005.

Among her many honors and awards, Dr. Grande was named as a "founding scholar" to The Paulo and Nita Freire International Project for Critical Pedagogy at McGill University, CA. As part of this project she was invited to attend an international meeting of Freire-ian scholars in Baeza, Spain (2009).

Dr. Lindquist earned her bachelor's degree in Indian Studies and English at the University of North Dakota and a master's degree in public administration (Indian health systems emphasis) at the University of South Dakota . As a Bush Foundation Leadership Fellow, she earned a doctorate in educational leadership at the University of North Dakota .

Dr. Lindquist began responsibilities as President of Cankdeska Cikana (Little Hoop) Community College in 2003, which serves the Spirit Lake Dakota community and is her home reservation. Dr. Lindquist is an adjunct faculty member in Community Medicine & Rural Health at the UND School of Medicine & Health Sciences. She is a founding member of the National Indian Women's Health Resource Center, a nonprofit advocacy organization. Dr. Lindquist served as member of the Council of Public Representatives (COPR), an advisory council to the director of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and is a former executive director of the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission.
