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Global Outreach in Africa: Charles Okigbo

As part of its global outreach programming, NDSU is significantly expanding its sphere of influence through new collaborative initiatives in Africa. According to NDSU's Africa representative, Charles Okigbo, Professor of Communication, who is on developmental leave in Kenya and Nigeria, "the new overtures from NDSU have been warmly received by African groups which are eager to take advantage of the opportunities NDSU presents them for mutually beneficial collaborative engagements in training, research and services to their communities."

Through the goodwill of the Office of International Programs, NDSU has signed a memoranda of understanding with universities in Kenya, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Rwanda, and Uganda. Plans are at advanced stages for close collaboration with the Uni-

versity of Nigeria, Nsukka for joint hosting of professional development workshops that will be led by NDSU professors in agriculture, communication, and human development, among others. The Nigerian partners have expressed strong interest in workshops on food safety, grants development, public speaking, speech writing, and women leadership. NDSU has considerably capacity to train in all these areas.

Evie Myers, Vice President for Equity, Diversity and Global Outreach is optimistic the Africa initiatives can be sustained beyond the period of Professor Okigbo's developmental leave. "There is palpable enthusiasm about NDSU extending its sphere of influence globally into Africa, and other world regions," Myers said. "Such an extension provides opportunities for NDSU students, faculty

and staff to become more actively engaged with the international community, especially now that we are sharpening the focus of our global outreach programs."

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NDSU Hosts Fulbright Scholar from Luxembourg

Dr. Samee Khan, Assistant Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering, served as the faculty host for Fulbright Scholar, Giorgio Luigi Valentini, a graduate student of Italian descent, studying at the University of Luxembourg. Valentini spent six months working with Dr. Khan in the NDSU-CIIT Green Computing and Communications Laboratory (GCC Lab) building meta-models for cloud computing and developing resource management methodologies for cloud computing paradigms.

The GCC Lab embodies the spirit of Senator Fulbright's goal of increasing international understanding, cooperation, and peace via scholarly collaboration. The laboratory is a bi-institutional, multi-departmental initiative to bring together faculty, staff, and students of NDSU and COMSTATS Institute of Information Technology, Islamabad, Pakistan, to conduct research on making computing and communications energy efficient.

According to Dr. Khan, "Giorgio also embodied the true spirit of a Ful-

bright scholar." Having lived in Latin America and Europe as he was growing up, "he acquired an appreciation for all fellow human beings and cultures, and as a student valued their reasoning and thoughts processes." It seems that Valentini continued his ability to take the best from every experience while he was at NDSU as well. When asked to comment for this article he said, "My stay was a wonderful experience, it becomes then almost impossible to summarize it with a sentence, a quote or any observation." He went on to add "I left a piece of my heart in Fargo."
