

## **Thomas Moe – BS 1972 Pharmacy**

Thomas Ardell Moe, 65, Bismarck, died January 8, 2015, at his home after a two-year battle with cancer, surrounded by his family. A memorial service will be held on Tuesday at 10:30 AM at Church of Corpus Christi in Bismarck with Rev. Paul Becker officiating. The family will be receiving visitors from 5:00 – 7:00 PM on Monday at Parkway Funeral Service, 2330 Tyler Parkway, Bismarck, where a vigil service will begin at 7:00 PM. Cremation has taken place.
