So, across all those things I've elevated again a couple of councils. A council on retention which relates to that first focus area. When we recruit students here we want them to be successful. We need to do everything we can to make sure that they progress and have an amazing experience so we're going to continue to make sure that that's critical. I mentioned earlier another council on diversity, inclusion, and respect is going to be at the presidential level and so I want to continue to emphasize the importance and value of that.

And on the research front, if you recall, I did a little reorganizing there and I'm going to make sure that research Carnegie R1 classification is a top priority as well. So, all those things are going to be big key areas of focus. Like I said, crisscrossing the campus community getting feedback on all of those. Because every time I meet with these groups I learn something that's really helpful and I need that I need all the help I can get. But trying to get as much community buy-in as possible and then candidly as much focus as possible moving through the semester.

And so with that I hope you're all having a great week I'm looking forward to homecoming which is right around the corner. We're going to be celebrating a number of activities during that week including a lot of our contributions around R1 being a research institution and all of our athletics events but all the things that we're doing for our students as well.
