Research Assistant Professor in the Department of Plant Sciences

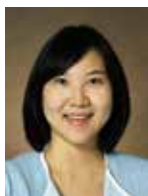

MUHAMMED JAVED IQBAL

Research Assistant Professor in the Department of Plant Sciences

Iqbal earned his B.Sc. in 1985 and M.Sc. in 1988 from the University of the Punjab in Lahore, Pakistan, and his Ph.D. in 1995 from University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Iqbal has mapped genes for resistance to sudden death syndrome of soybean and integrated these genes in a physical map of soybean genome. He has developed genomic resources for host (soybean) and pathogen (fungus). Iqbal also has developed and characterized recombinant inbred line populations of soybean and released for application in commercial breeding programs. He has developed DNA markers for the identification of rye introgressions in wheat and DAN fingerprinting of ornamental plants and tree species.



YAGNA PR JARAJAPU

Assistant Professor in the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences

He earned his B. Pharm. in 1991 and M. Pharm in 1993 from Andhra University in Visakhapatnam, India, M.Sc. in 1998 from University of Strathclyde in Glasgow, Scotland, and Ph.D. in 2002 from Glasgow Caledonian University in Scotland. He has published 26 peer-reviewed original research articles and 50 abstracts in high-standing journals.
