Articles in sections 1-4 will be especially helpful, as well as the introduction, "What are 40,000 psychology majors going to do next year?"
Occupational Outlook Handbook, 1994-1995 Edition, U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, DC, 1994	This government document is a comprehensive guide to occupations. It includes job descriptions, education and training requirements, advancement possibilities, salaries, and employment outlooks for 250 occupations. In addition, it describes other sources of career education, training, and financial aid information as well as resources for special groups such as youth, the handicapped, veterans, women and minorities.
