Curriculum Sequence Advice

There is a reason that courses are numbered lowest to highest: you should take lower-numbered intro/basics courses before more advanced higher-number courses. Know that official prerequisites are now enforced (blocked registration).

Freshmen/Sophomores:

- 1. If you have not yet taken ANTH 111, do so in the fall (several in-class sections plus an online course option) or summer (online only); likewise, if you have not taken SOC 110, do so (several in-class sections and online.)
- 2. You need to take your two 200 ANTH level courses before registering for 3-400 level elective ANTH courses (3-400 level courses are best taken in your sophomore/junior/senior year after all 100/200 level core courses are completed.)
- 3. Fill the remainder of your schedule with General Education and AHSS College requirements courses.

 Juniors:

Community Entrepreneurship applied research coursework abroad available in Nicaragua via the La Suerte Maderas Fieldschool – ask Dr. Sather-Wagstaff for more information.

- 1. You must take the required advanced writing course (choose one of these based upon your goals):
 - ENGL 358 Writing in the Humanities/Social Sciences
 - ENGL 324 Writing in the Sciences
 - ENGL 320 Business and Professional Writing
 - ENGL 459 Research in Writing Grants and Proposals
- 2. If you have completed your core lower-division ANTH courses (100-200 level), enroll in the 3-400 level ANTH courses for your electives

Seniors – anyone planning to graduate in Dec 2012 or May 2013:

- 1. Take ANTH 498 Senior Capstone (offered during falls only).
- 2. Complete your 3-400 level ANTH elective courses. Make sure you have taken the upper division writing course (see Juniors section).
- 3. Run a Graduation Degree Audit via Campus Connection to ensure that you are on track.

If you are interested in field school experience, take a look at some of the

links (only a few samples) to the right. At least a year in advance, work with your advisor to find the right opportunity for you. The summer between your junior and senior year is the ideal time to do a field school for hands-on experience. Consider the language skills you may need as well.
