






Updates from Residence Life

Through new construction and ongoing updates, The Department of Residence Life is continuing our efforts to grow with and for our students. Apartment 1701 will open in August, and as of May 1, all 86 units have been leased. Keep in mind that faculty, staff, post-doctoral research fellows and visiting scholars/researchers are eligible to live in our apartments and we have openings for two-bed/two-bath units in Niskanen Expansion.

Cater Hall will open in fall of 2019 with 440 beds reserved solely for our second-year students. This hall will provide a state-of-the-art residence hall living experience. We are excited to be able to provide this additional space to upperclassmen students.

All of our residence halls receive ongoing updates, but it is our bathroom renovations that are getting the most buzz from prospective students and parents. "It looks like a spa" is the comment most often heard after tours. Churchill, Dinan, Reed, and Stockbridge all have fully renovated bathrooms. Johnson Hall will be renovated this summer.

And as always, as our academic year ends, summer housing and conference season begins! Residence Life will house more than 7,000 people for summer school, conferences, summer camps and summer guest housing.



Upcoming Trainings

The office of Vice Provost for Faculty and Equity offers several education and training opportunities throughout the year.

Equal Opportunity/ Title IX training is required of all employees to complete either online yearly or in person every three years. There is also a Supervisor Supplement Training that covers the responsibilities of supervisors in addressing potential climate issues on your work areas.



Safe Zone Training is also offered to educate people about sexual orientation and gender identity/ expression issues, create a visible network of Allies to provide support to the NDSU LGBTQ community and provide accurate information about sexual orientation and gender identity/ expression diversity, issues, and resources within the community.



Community of Respect training is offered to improve inter-cultural competencies and provide hands-on strategies to assist participants in learning how to work more effectively with colleagues and students whose cultural backgrounds are different from our own. The NDSU Staff Recognition Awards social was held on April 12, 2018. There were 30 nominations for 16 individuals and two team nominations. The committee had chosen nine individual winners and one team winner. Out of the individual winners, there were 5 winners (Susan Finneseth, Samantha Johnson, Jered Pigeon, Tayt Rinehardt, and Matt Skoy) from the 3000 band, 1 winner from the 4000 band (Deb Johnson), 2 winners (Kelly Hoyt and Loretta Askew) from the 5000 band, and 1 winner (Devra Gooden) from the 7000 band. Team Academic Athletics won the team award, individuals on this team included Kelli Layman, Ashley Harris, and Carter Kruckenberg.

The certificates were given out at the Staff Recognition Awards social on April 12th. Individual winners received a \$250 cash award (less applicable taxes) and the team members received \$600 divided equally between the members (less applicable taxes). Staff Recognition Awards are annually presented to the broad banded staff at NDSU.

For the FY 17-18, the Staff Recognition Committee has handed out fourteen Campus Kudos awards during monthly Staff Senate meetings. Campus Kudos is a certificate of appreciation for someone who has gone above and beyond to make Campus a great place to endure.

I am a product of North Dakota public education; a graduate of Bismarck Public Schools and a proud alumna of our North Dakota State University. I am incredibly grateful for my time as an undergraduate at NDSU and for the transformative experiences that shaped who and where I am today. It is an absolute honor to work as an Organizer for the organization fighting to protect and advance this and all public institutions of learning in our state - North Dakota United. NDU represents all 30,000 public employees: K-12 teachers and support professionals; state, county and municipal workers; and you, one of the over 7,000 employees of the University System. North Dakota United is on the front lines of the fight for worker healthcare and retirement benefits, living wages, and safety on campus. We build power by speaking with strength in numbers to those who make the decisions that affect you in the workplace. Although North Dakota public employees do not enjoy the right to collectively bargaining our contract, we exercise our strength by engaging in the electoral and political process. Did you know Governor Burgum has called for another 10-13% reduction to the higher education budget? Did you know there are talks of increasing your out-of-pocket healthcare costs and charging you a premium on your insurance? This, after two years without a raise, even for cost of living. We don't think that's fair. But we also believe that things can and should be better. The members of North Dakota United work hard every day to build power within our workplace, to increase our engagement and to strengthen our government relations. The union makes us strong, and we make the union strong. Have you considered standing with your coworkers and adding your voice to our power by becoming a member of NDU?

Great public education and great public service are what make North Dakota such a special place to live and North Dakota United thanks you for your talent and dedication to this University. You are an integral piece of this vibrant community and you deserve to have your voice heard on campus and in the halls of the capitol. We will continue to work hard and build power with you through the 2018 midterm election, the 2019 legislative session, and beyond.
