

Money-saving tips for rising energy costs

Americans are expected to spend more for heating oil, natural gas, coal, and electricity this winter. Those heaviest

hit will probably be natural gas customers in the Midwest — with costs 71 percent higher than last winter, according to the Washington Post. One way to get a handle on these costs is through a

home energy audit, which identifies energy-saving opportunities specific to your home. To find out more:

Cass County Electric Cooperative customers may call Marshal Albright, 356-

4532. The audit takes about one hour and there is no cost.

Xcel Energy customers call 1-800-895-4999. The audit takes about two hours (\$35 will be added to your bill following the audit).

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More Energy Savings

- ▶ Turning your thermostat above the desired temperature won't heat your house more quickly—it will only make your furnace work harder. Also, turning it too low can actually cost you more because the contents of the house have to be re-heated. Recommended temperature ranges are 68 to 70 degrees while you're home and awake and 60 to 65 while you're asleep or not at home.
- ▶ Don't leave a ventilation fan running. In just one hour a kitchen or bathroom fan can blow away a houseful of heated air.
- ▶ Turning down the temperature on your water heater to the warm setting (120 degrees) not only saves on energy, it increases safety—no more scalded hands.


Campus Kudos
