NDSU COUNSELOR EDUCATION PROGRAM'S MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the NDSU counselor education program is to graduate students who possess the appropriate academic preparation, clinical skills, dispositions, and personal growth to excel as professional counselors and counselor educators. Our priorities focus on relational practices, teaching, research/scholarly activities, and service. The overall goal is to instill in students a commitment to lifelong learning and professional counselor practice that integrates theory, ethically and culturally appropriate counseling strategies, research, and specific professional setting expectations. The standards promulgated by our accrediting body, CACREP, and a variety of professional associations guide the program's curriculum and objectives.

The NDSU CNED faculty members' priorities are teaching, research/scholarly activities, and service. The goal of the Counselor Education Program is to facilitate student learning. Although expectations for each faculty member vary, as a group, the faculty members expect that faculty and students are committed to learning as a life-long process that involves intellectual, affective, and experiential components. NDSU Counselor Education Program graduates possess the appropriate knowledge, dispositions, and skills for their chosen career field and understand the importance of theory, research, diversity, technology, and ethical practice.

DEMOGRAPHICS

The deadline for priority admission consideration into the NDSU Counselor Education program is February 1 each year. Applicants were also given an extended deadline of April 1 provided there was space available in the master's and/or doctoral programs at that time. In 2024-2025, the NDSU Counselor Education program put a hold on School Counseling admissions and did not accept applications for this program. After the initial review of applications, selected applicants were invited to interviews which are held in the spring of each year.



We use multiple assessment measures to determine if our program is providing students will an appropriate educational experience which includes didactic coursework, clinical experiences, and personal growth opportunities so that our students become successful professional counselors, educators, and supervisors after they graduate from our program. Each semester we gather assessment data pertaining to students' professional dispositions.	Based on the data collected over the past few years, students' professional dispositions has been one of the NDSU Counselor Education (CNED) program's greatest concerns. Taking this information into consideration, the CNED faculty made the decision to create new disposition forms and procedures for working with students who need remediation in this area. We continuously monitor student dispositions and discuss any student concerns during each CNED faculty meeting. The CNED faculty have also implemented a more intense screening process of admission applications. In addition, the faculty are trying to address student dispositional issues as early as possible and creating remediation plans if needed.		
Feedback and evaluations completed during Practicum indicated that students would benefit by having the <i>CNED 732: Family Counseling</i> course earlier in the students' graduate program.	As a result of this information, the sequence of the master's degree courses was changed. The students will take CNED 732 before they enroll in Practicum since it is helpful for them to have a better understanding of family counseling before they begin seeing clients.

Students have also been encouraged to present their research interests at professional conferences. It is recommended that the program continues to explore methods for supporting students' research activities.

Program faculty monitor student participation levels in professional counseling organizations. Feedback from current and former students indicated that that lack of financial resources is a major barrier to attending professional conferences as a graduate student.	The new CNED 866: Leadership and Advocacy course for doctoral students has served as a catalyst for more doctoral students to serve in leadership positions at state and national levels, and to get involved in advocacy activities. The faculty have made strong effort to encourage students to attend and present at professional conferences. One of our goals is to continue to work at increasing our students' participation in counseling organizations. The faculty continue to advertise online conference that graduate students can attend and/or present at since funding for student travel & professional conferences continues to be an issue for many of our graduate students.
Feedback from students has indicated that many of them have questions about the licensure process in North Dakota and Minnesota.	The Chi Sigma Iota chapter at NDSU has coordinated with our NDSU internship coordinator to provide a workshop on navigating the licensure process in North Dakota and Minnesota. It is recommended that this workshop be held each year for students.

NDSU Counselor Education faculty gather professional disposition data each semester. The faculty use this dispositional form to help assess students' level of <i>self-awareness and their ability to self-reflect</i> .	Faculty have used this data to help identify students who need remediation or some other type of support. Students are also required to engage in self-reflection activities while completing their coursework in the program. The recommendation is to continue having students engage in self-reflection activities.

During practicum, practicum students solicit feedback from their clients who receive counseling in the NDSU Community Counseling Services (CCS) clinic. Clients complete this feedback form at the end of each counseling session.	The practicum instructor uses the information gathered from the completed client feedback forms during supervision sessions with their practicum students. This information is shared with the practicum student in a timely manner so that the student has the opportunity to make any needed changes to the counseling they are providing their clients.
The NDSU Counselor Education program needed to identify a more efficient methods for gathering information during Practicum. Our old hard copy system needed to be updated to reflect current counseling work environments.	The NDSU Community Counseling Services (CCS) training clinic now uses Titanium Schedule, an electronic client records system, that also allows counselors-intraining (CITs) to complete electronic supervision notes. Practicum supervisors can also complete written supervision notes during supervision meetings.

The NDSU Counselor Education program experienced multiple issues with its session recording platform, Landro.

The program stopped using Landro and switch to VALT (a video audio learning tool). VALT has been a much more effective recording and record-keeping software for the NDSU CCS training clinic.

SUBSTANTIAL PROGRAM CHANGES

- In 2022, the NDSU Counselor Education program physically moved to a different building on the NDSU campus. The program and its training clinic (NDSU Community Counseling Services) are now located in Morrill Hall.
- In 2023, the NDSU Counselor Education program put a temporary pause on school counseling admissions. The decision was made due to declining school counseling enrollment. A significant reason for the decline in school counseling enrollment was due to the fact that 3 regional counseling programs each received multi-million dollar grants to recruit and fund school counseling graduate students. During this pause in school counseling admission, more clinical mental health counseling students were admitted into the program. The Counselor Education program will reevaluate this decision during the 2025-2026 academic year.
- In fall 2024, NDSU reduced the number of academic colleges from 8 colleges to 5 colleges. The College of Human Development and Education which was the home of the Counselor Education program was dissolved. During the reconfiguration of the academic colleges, the NDSU Counselor Education program was moved out of the School of Education and was moved into the newly formed College of Health and Human Sciences.
- In fall 2024, a new dean, Dr. Teresa Conner, was selected for the new College of Health and Human Sciences.
- In fall 2024, NDSU Counselor Education faculty began transitioning their courses to the 2024 CACREP standards.
- In January 2025, the NDSU Counselor Education program was merged with the Human Development and Family Science department. Dr. Joel Hektner served as the department chair.
