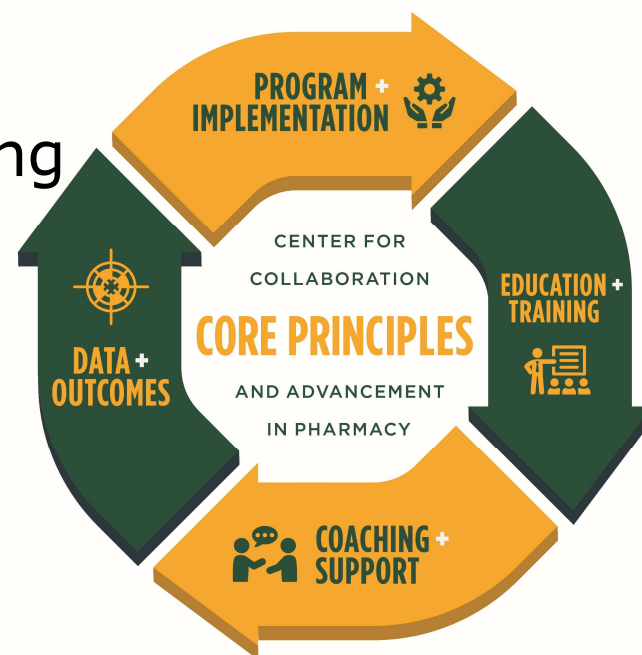

Requirement Refresher

For every drug/drug category being prescribed, the pharmacist needs to have a Patient Assessment Protocol.

What to expect from CAP?

 - Evidence based/peer-reviewed
 - Examples of inclusion/exclusion criteria
 - Examples of referral and follow-up criteria
- Patient education handouts
 - Follow-up criteria
 - Monitoring

Test-and-Treat: Supplies

- Medical grade physical assessment
 - Blood pressure
 - Stethoscope
 - Thermometer
 - Scale
 - Pulse oximeter
 - Clock with a second hand

Test-and-Treat: Supplies

- Personal Protective Equipment
 - Gloves
 - Masks/face shields
- Testing supplies
 - Tests
 - Tongue depressor (Strep)
 - Clock with a second hand
 - Sanitizing wipes
 - Sharps/biohazard disposal
 - Timers

Test-and-Treat: Supplies

- Documentation
 - Intake
 - Payment
 - Patient consent
 - Care documentation

Revised protocol 5/18/2026

This protocol provides the authorized pharmacist the authority to prescribe and administer an immunization to any individual 3 years and older in accordance with the standard of care and scientific evidence.
