Highlights of the 2006 MSCTC-Moorhead Secondhand Smoke Study of Students and Faculty/Staff, February 2007

Study Design

Two web surveys were conducted in October and November 2006, at the Moorhead campus of Minnesota State Community and Technical College (MSCTC-Moorhead) using a complete census of students and of faculty/staff. Preferences/Opinions Regarding Campus Smoking Policies

- 55% of students and 72% of faculty/staff at MSCTC-Moorhead know the existing campus smoking policy.
- The vast majority of students and faculty/staff say the smoking policy is not enforced well outdoors.
- 35% of students and 56% of faculty/staff are *very likely* to support a smoke-free campus policy.
- Only 13% of students and 5% of faculty/staff say they would be less likely to attend or work at MSCTC-Moorhead if a smoke-free campus policy was implemented.

Campus Community's Experiences with Tobacco and Secondhand Smoke

- 43% of students and 24% of faculty/staff are tobacco users; 26% of students and 12% of faculty/staff are "regular users" of tobacco.
- The vast majority of smokers start smoking before finishing high school.
- The greatest influence on smokers to start smoking is peers.
- Only 11% of students and 18% of faculty/staff are not interested in quitting smoking.
- Among smokers, 38% of students and 29% of faculty/staff have tried to quit smoking within the last 12 months. And, the vast majority of those trying to quit have had multiple attempts.
