About this Course Genre has been a source of debate and on occasion dissension among literary critics, experts in composition and rhetoric, students of film, linguists, and social scientists. This course will focus mainly on literary texts, especially instances of pastoral, romance, and the sonnet, but will also devote attention to the centrality of genre to many types of discourse.

Among the questions we will explore together: Who creates and defines a genre, and to what ends? What are the potentialities and perils of extending the concept to, say, politics or social institutions like Thanksgiving dinner? How do genres structure various forms of social interaction? How should we approach this subject in the classroom?
