Let's start with some great news: 32 student veterans graduated from NDSU in December 2023, and 27 of them (84%!) had a GPA of 3.0 or better. Congratulations to all of them on these achievements, and thanks to all the faculty and staff who helped them perform so well and prepared them to excel in the civilian workforce. We wish them all fair winds and following seas as they begin their next adventures!

In other news, we continue to track statistics about GI Bill beneficiary students. The Spring 2024 numbers represent those registered as of January 3, 2024, and are preliminary: Spring 2024 - 303; Fall 2023 - 343; Spring 2023 - 328.

Here is what our military-connected students are studying by college:

Arts and Sciences: 95

Engineering: 66

Health Professions and Human Sciences: 63

Business: 54

Agriculture, Food Systems, and Natural Resources: 22

Currently Undeclared or Non-degree: 2

Graduate School: \*1

\*34 of our 303 military students are working on advanced/professional degrees within Colleges other than the Graduate School.

With the recent restructuring of colleges, the College of Arts and Sciences now hosts the greatest number of military students. Within this college, almost half (45 of 95) are in one of only four majors: Psychology (14), Criminal Justice (13), Biological Sciences (10), and Architecture (8).

Prior to the realignment of colleges, the College of Engineering had typically been the most popular for our military students, and still has the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest number of students. Here, 48 of 66 (almost 75%) are in one of the following three disciplines: Construction Engineering/Management (19), Computer Science/Software Engineering (15), or Mechanical Engineering (14).

Post realignment, the College of Health Professions and Human Sciences is now home to the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest group of military students. 46 of 63 (almost 75%) are majoring in one of only three programs: Nursing (26), Human Development & Family Science (12), Pharmacy/ Pharm Sciences (8).

Within the College of Business, nearly half of military students (22 of 54) are majoring in Business Administration, with another cluster (7) choosing Finance.

This semester, NDSU's Community Counselling Services will be hosting discussion groups for military-affiliated students every Tuesday at Noon in Morrill Hall 214 starting January 30th. Students don't have to commit to all sessions; just come when you can! Topics will be whatever the day's group participants want to discuss, and will be moderated by master's-level grad students under the supervision of the professional counseling staff.





# Military and Veteran Certification Office



Greetings from the Military and Veterans Certification Office.

The fall semester was a crazy busy semester with a lot of changes. Army ignited continued to improve with payments going out when 19% of the semester is completed. The deadline to apply was midnight on December 30, 2023, with everyone required to get them in by last Friday due to the holiday.

If you didn't get it in, there is no way to apply late. The Army gave a hard deadline and I sent out multiple emails and texts telling everyone about the deadline and requirements. You can still request STR if you are a MN Guard member up to 90 days after the semester ends. ND Guard is a bit

different and you must sign up for STA by the start of the semester with a requirement to sign up for FTA as well. Check with Chief Bohl at the ND Education Office for the Guard at 701-333-3064.



With almost 500 students being tracked, it is imperative that you help me when you don't want benefits. Please let me know as soon as you can so we can refrain from submitting and causing a debt on your behalf. I do my best to ensure we catch everyone.

On another note, if you are taking classes at another institution, you must let me know so I can do a parent letter. This tells the other school to submit you for your GI Bill certification. This has a huge effect when you are not full time at NDSU and the other school puts you over full-time status.

# **IN MEMORIAM**



Maj. Jeff Hoernemann, a 2014 NDSU graduate, died November 29, 2023, at the age of 32 with seven other airmen in an Osprey crash in Japan. The below segment about Jeff is from an <u>article</u> from the *Air Force Times* that highlighted those killed in the crash.

Hoernemann was a CV-22 instructor pilot and the chief of weapons and tactics at the 21st Special Operations Squadron at Yokota Air Base, Japan.

He began his journey to military service when he moved from the Minneapolis suburb of Andover, Minnesota, to the Reserve Officer Training Corps program at North Dakota State University. There, Hoememann earned a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering in 2014 as well as his officer commission, and entered active duty in March 2015.

He trained to fly the CV-22 and proved himself as a passionate, competent aviator, the Air Force said. Hoernemann was a humble, "gentle giant" at the schoolhouse, with a passion for learning and flying, said Andrew, a former instructor in the CV-22 community. Air Force Times agreed to withhold his last name because he was not authorized to speak to the press. When Hoernemann graduated from Osprey training, Andrew said, his sense of humor shone through in a speech that highlighted how small the Air Force's CV-22 community is.

Hoernemann held jobs at the 8th Special Operations Squadron and 1st Special Operations Wing at Hurlburt Field, Florida, and deployed to Afghanistan multiple times as part of Operation Freedom's Sentinel. At the 21st SOS, "Jeff was the unit's subject matter expert on CV-22B employment and shouldered the responsibility for developing new tactics, techniques and procedures," the Air Force said.

His military honors include the Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal, Aerial Achievement Medal and the air and space commendation and achievement medals, among others. "His character was the benchmark of officership in the United States Air Force," 21st Special Operations Squadron Commander Lt. Col. Tyler Oldham said in a statement. "Jeff was the best of us. His selflessness and leadership through example have left enduring marks upon the culture and values of the members of Air Force Special Operations Command."

To know Hoememann was to love him, the airman's wife, Jess Boozer, said Dec. 4 in a <u>public tribute on Facebook</u>. The couple had been together for more than eight years. "If I knew Wednesday morning when you left for work would be the last time I saw you, I would have hugged you tighter and never let you go," Boozer wrote. "You will always be my best friend and the greatest love of my life."



Lt. Shelly Fink

Lt. Shelly Fink, a 2014 NDSU graduate and North Dakota National Guard Airman, died December 24, 2023, at her home in Barnesville, Minnesota. She was 33. Shelly was well-known in the region and loved by many.

Shelly served in the 119th Wing's Happy Hooligans since 2009. She served full-time for the North Dakota Air National Guard as a recruiter from 2014-2022. In 2022, Shelly became a commissioned officer. Since 2023, she served as the 119th Wing Public Affairs Officer. In her civilian occupation, she served as the Director of Growth for Hatch Realty in Fargo.

In a statement released by the North Dakota National Guard, Maj. Gen. Alan Dohrmann, North Dakota's Adjutant General, extended the NDNG's "deepest condolences" and added, "Lt. Fink served her country and the State of North Dakota with a determination that could not be matched. She will be greatly missed."

Col. Mitch Johnson, 119th Wing commander stated, "The entire Hooligan family is deeply saddened by the loss of one of our own. We are heartbroken beyond words. Lt. Fink had such a huge personality and her infectious energy touched so many lives throughout the wing."

Shelly's husband, Zack, posted, "Shelly died on Christmas Eve. I don't know what to say, but I do know that the person I love the most in the whole world - the most kind hearted, fun, joyous, and beautiful person inside and out, is gone. She brought joy to so many people's lives, if you're reading this you're probably one of them. You may be hurting too, we will all miss her so much. In lieu of the normal sympathy comments, share a story, or a photo, or a laugh you shared with her. She'd want it that way."
